INTERACTING AND TAKING RISKS

Simulators offer nursing students real time learning opportunities

You have a patient on the table in pain and vomiting blood. What type of assessments would you make? How would you treat them? These are the types of decisions that nursing students have to make in Joe Johnson's Critical Care course where a high fidelity simulator, or computerized manikin, helps create the scenario.

It's these types of beyond-your-comfort-zone exercises that Joe, and instructor Dawnette Johnson, say are valuable to PC nursing students, providing scenarios beyond students' comfort level where learning happens.


"We want students to get certain practices," Joe said. "I can't order up a gastric ulcer bleed so we create the situation for them."

Peninsula College is home to a family of simulators on the second floor of the Allied Health building that respond to commands administered by a technician in the control room, from the other side of a one-way window. Joe teaches with a male adult simulator and Dawnette uses a pregnant female, pediatric patient and an infant. There are also an array of low fidelity simulators that Joe says operate like a more complex Mr. Potato Head doll.

"We still use a lot of moulage and that's where you set the scene with props and make up and fake blood," Joe said. "We use white powder to make them look pale." The simulator technician manages the set up, and the faculty run the simulations and assess student performance. Two students work together in the classroom while a third student plays another role. All remaining students actively observe.

The six hour gastric ulcer simulation was broken up into three scenes, with each scene having a different component of assessment. The scenes typically last 30 minutes with a 45 minute to an hour debrief afterward, where instructors and classmates give feedback.

"Most students are nervous about simulation because they know they're being watched," Joe said. "We promote an environment of 'this is a place to do



something wrong without repercussions.' In doing something wrong they take away something valuable."

Joe said this allows the instructors to create the learning outcomes that they want in a high rewards, low risk and supportive environment. Feedback stays within the learning group. Each simulation runs through an evaluation process that helps the instructors find ways to tweak them and make them better.

"We're lucky in the nursing department in that we get students for two years," Joe said. "We get to watch them and see the lightbulb go on for them. Being a part of it is pretty cool."

Collaborative, team teaching is what really drew Dawnette to PC. Working with simulators was a natural fit for her as she enjoys both technology and troubleshooting. In addition, she is always looking for ways to do more interactive teaching with students both in the classroom as well as in a clinical setting.

"Being able to practice with the realism is really effective in helping students learn," Dawnette said. "I can get students engaged this way and it's a more effective way of teaching."

Dawnette's course, Mental Health Nursing, is taught through simulation, and includes a patient who is having a crisis due to anxiety, and experiencing elder abuse and depression. The exercise focuses on how nurses can perform an effective assessment when they suspected abuse of an older person, especially with the suspected perpetrator in the room. They also learn about reporting elder abuse and how to assess depression in the elderly.

In all courses, she wants students to ask themselves, "What should happen? How can I improve patient outcomes through my actions?"

"I don't tell them everything. I ask them questions and have them go find the answers which helps them increase their healthcare literacy." Her students research credible sources that discuss standards of care, and consider how they will implement what they have learned by talking it out and problem solving.

Working with newborn and pediatric simulators has been rewarding for students. Some PC nursing program graduates who are hired in obstetrics are seen as having adequate skills to begin as a novice nurse in a specialty field, which usually would require some generalist experience prior to working in a specialty.

"They still have a lot to learn, but that they are seen as qualified is very gratifying," Dawnette said.

In addition to teaching at PC, Joe works at Jefferson Healthcare in Port Townsend as a nurse.

"I get to see previous students and get to hear how great they are doing on the job," he said. "It's nice to have the positive reinforcement that we're doing something good here."

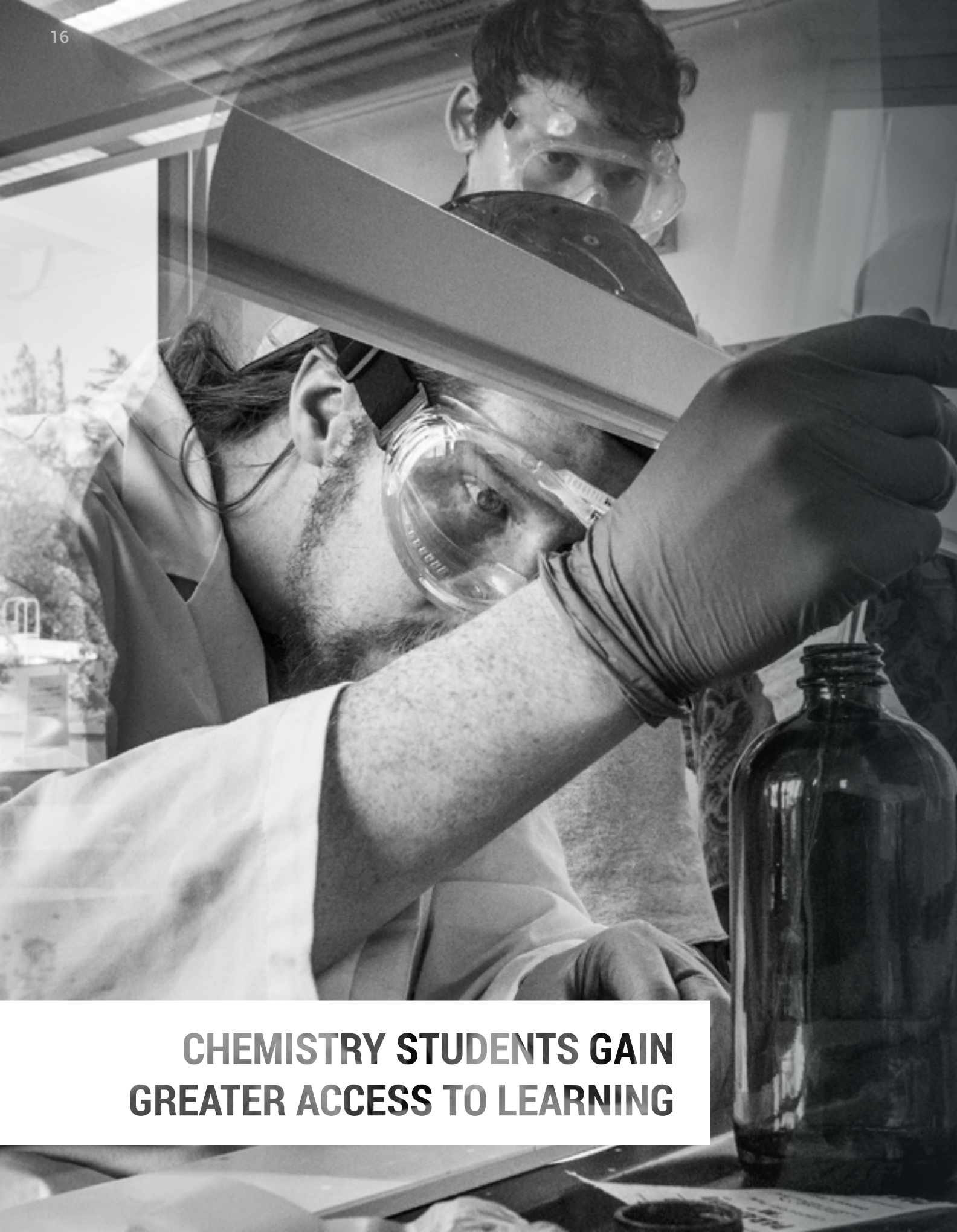

**CHEMISTRY STUDENTS GAIN
GREATER ACCESS TO LEARNING**

Hard boiled eggs aren't usually considered school supplies, but in the newly updated organic chemistry lab in Keegan Hall students extracted cholesterol from their yokes, while practicing different isolation and purification techniques. Once removed, the cholesterol, an alcohol, was turned into cholestenone, a ketone which has completely different properties. The idea behind the exercise was that they could take a natural product, purify it, and change its functionality.

The Peninsula College chemistry department recently acquired a state-of-the-art Fourier transform infrared spectrometer, an instrument typically found in an industrial setting or national lab. Using this instrument, the students were able to verify that they had turned cholesterol into something new. It's access to top notch equipment which enables students to engage with learning in a highly experiential fashion that chemistry

instructor Dr. Ben Weintraub believes gives PC students a leg up in their training.



"If you took majors organic chemistry at a large university there would be hundreds of people in your class," Weintraub said. "PC has a brand new lab and a really nice faculty/student ratio where students get a lot of attention and personalized time."

For students who want to apply to medical, dental or veterinary school, Peninsula College is an affordable and accessible place to take those courses, Weintraub said. The amount of face time allows him to really personalize learning to the students, and lab fees are kept low.

Weintraub describes his classes as very interactive and hands-on, with students continually coming up to the whiteboard and working out problems while getting his direct feedback. In general chemistry, his students learn to make a nylon polymer from scratch. After synthesizing nylon fibers, they spool them and use the spectrometer to analyze the nylon and verify that they have, in fact, made nylon. A student who is working as an EMT was really interested in flame retardant clothing. Her special project was to analyze the chemical nature of a Kevlar weave fabric and perform various tests on it. Having opportunities to explore personal interests through special projects and personalized curriculum makes learning more relevant and exciting, Weintraub says.

"When I think about my students I am impressed by the amount of potential I see in them," Weintraub said. "They constantly meet and exceed my expectations."

Sustainable energy is an interest of Weintraub's. Midway through his undergraduate career he had an opportunity to ride on a hydrogen powered fuel cell bus. He also got to talk with the folks who were developing it which got him excited about the technology and what's behind it.

This carried over into his grad school experience and he ended up doing his thesis research on nanotechnology enabled solar cells. PC students are invited to participate in Weintraub's ongoing research on the subject. Since he began at PC in 2011 he has been working with students

on special projects in the areas of nanotechnology and green energy.

"I've been working with students on making catalysts for converting water into hydrogen and oxygen using sunlight," he said. The focus has been on addressing some of the fundamental questions behind the chemical machinery used to convert the water into hydrogen and oxygen gas. Last spring, three students presented their results at a UW Bothell undergraduate symposium and won first place on a poster they created about their findings. One student, Pallas Burhen, won a scholarship from American Chemical Society.

"In all the science research I do, I am interested in where the rubber meets the road –the practical applications for a sustainable energy solution," Weintraub said. "Part of my scholarship at the college is involved with these research projects and teaching chemistry through these projects." He also founded a local student chapter of the American Chemical Society at Peninsula College, which he sees as a gateway for students into the larger field of chemistry, allowing them to meet other people and network.

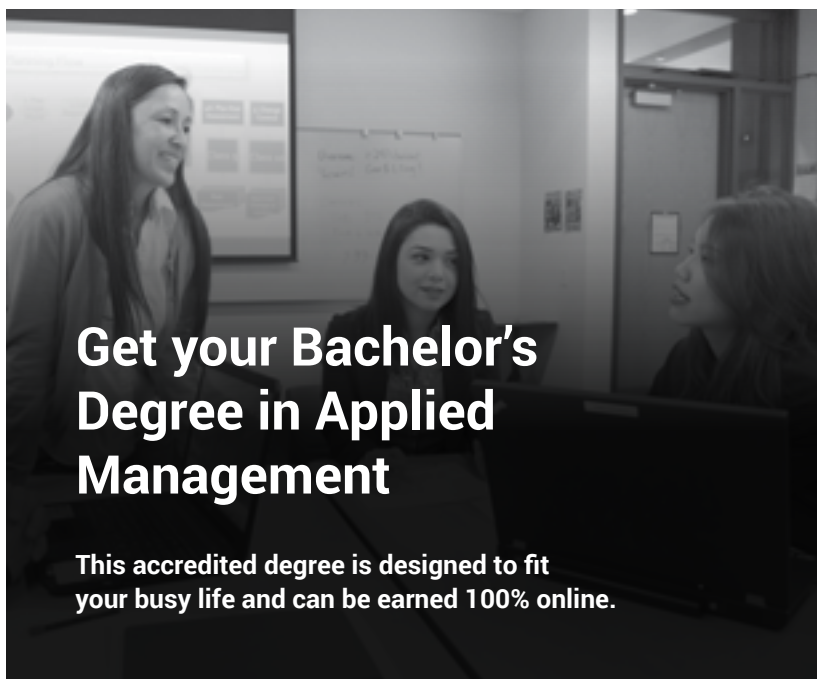
