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# What is Running Start?

- Statewide dual credit funding program for juniors and seniors
  - ✓ Credit is earned for college classes at <u>both</u> college and high school
  - $\checkmark$  Therefore, credit can apply to <u>both</u> high school and college graduation
- **Tuition is waived (not fees)** for participating students with quarterly documentation (RSEVF)
- Private and home school students must enroll in a **public school/district** to participate.

- Independent learners
- Students ready for an **adult learning environment**
- Students with good organizational skills and time management skills
- Students with a good **support** system at home and high school
- Students who use campus resources and are unafraid to ask for help
- Students who can **balance** school, work, & other responsibilities

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# How to Qualify for Running Start

- Enrollment at a public high school or school district
- Junior or Senior status (determined by high school)
- Eligible for college level English (ENGL 101) or college level math (Math 107 or above)

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# **Placement Options**

- High School Transcript
- College Placement Test, ACCUPLACER \$20.00 testing fee
- High School Smarter Balanced Assessment Scores
- ACT/SAT scores
- AP English Scores
- Unofficial college transcript showing completion of ENGL 101
- Placement results from another Washington state community college

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# **Costs of Participation in RS**

- Running Start is not 100% free
  - Tuition is waived for up to 15 credits per quarter (summer not included)
- Students are still responsible for the cost of:

Course & Student fees (lab, technology, bus pass/parking, wellness center, graduation and other class supplies)

**Tuition for pre-college** courses & credits over the funding limits (per RSEVF)

All other costs (books, supplies, transportation, etc.)

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### Fee Waiver / Book Assistance Program

#### Fee Waiver (free & reduced lunch students):

Income eligibility is confirmed via the RSEVF (for students who have qualified at any time during the past five years for the *free/reduced* lunch program) This waiver covers class fees (excluding consumable fees), and tuition for excess credits.

**Running Start Textbook Assistance** (*for students who qualify for free lunch only*): Free lunch eligibility documentation from the school district is required annually. Students are loaned books from the RS Book Library & also receive up to \$175.00 per quarter to purchase books in the campus bookstore.

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#### **Credits and Equivalency**

Most college classes are 5 college credits and equal to 1 high school credit

- A full-time RS student can earn up to 9 HS credits per year
- Tuition free college credit is based on the funding limit table on the RSEVF (basically more classes at the high school means less tuition free courses at the college)

Number of Classes taken at the HS 0-1 class 2 3 5-7 \*Number of College Credits Tuition Free

- = 15 credits (3 classes)
- = 12-13 credits
- = 10-11 credits
- = 3-6 credits

\*Allowed credits may vary- dependent on number of weekly minutes and terms at the high school

# Accommodations

 Students with documented disabilities can request accommodations through Peninsula College SSD. You will need to work with our SSD staff to receive your accommodation.

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# FERPA- Confidentiality of Student Records

- Academic records are protected by federal law. Even though a RS student may be under the age of 18, PC cannot release educational records to parents, families, guardians, or friends without the student's consent.
- Students may choose to give written consent for their records to be disclosed to parents or others. A Release of Information Form must be on file for the college to disclose any information to parents.

## What classes can be taken?

- Any college level class that the student meets the prerequisite for (on campus, online, hybrid).
- You will be assigned a PC Team Advisor based on which high school you attend
  - They will keep track of your remaining high school graduation requirements by following your Planning Form (Equivalency Guide)

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- Build a 2-year academic plan covering all high school classes needed and the courses to complete an Associate's degree
- Save one required HS class for senior year
- Try to finish all HS required classes by winter quarter your senior year
- Listen to the advice of your high school counselor and assigned PC Team Advisor

## Benefits

- Head start on college studies and transcript
- Save money on tuition
- Take a wide variety of classes that may not be offered at your high school.
- Potential to finish Associate degree
- Degree completers walk in the **PC graduation** ceremony
- Can participate in college clubs/activities, leadership, intramural sports & other programs. Participation on college sports teams is prohibited with the exception of Esports.

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# Considerations

- **Readiness** to be a college student
- Involvement in sports, drama, and other HS activities
- Classes cover more material in depth at a faster pace.
- The **college breaks** do not always align (holidays, finals, and vacations).
- **Grade impact** Grades are recorded on your HS and college transcript and become a part of your permanent record at PC. Low grades or failure to complete courses may jeopardize high school graduation, admission to another college or other future educational plans.

- Qualify through an approved alternative placement (or take the placement test). You must qualify into college level English or Math to participate in Running Start.

   Note: Submit all alternative placement documents for review to <a href="mailto:testing@pencol.edu">testing@pencol.edu</a>.
- Fill out the student portion of the Running Start Enrollment Verification Form (RSEVF) and sign the bottom of the form. Email your high school counselor the completed form to verify your intent to participate in RS. Your counselor will fill out their portion of the RSEVF, complete your Planning Form, and email them to testing@pencol.edu.

**Homeschool students** should email their high school and/or school district once they qualify. The school district and/or high school will fill out the Homebased Instruction Students Only Form and/or Planning Form and email them to testing@pencol.edu.

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#### Pay fees and purchase textbooks

After you register, you will be able to view your fees owed in your ctcLink Student Portal. The payment due date is listed on the Academic Calendar available on the website.

You may purchase your books from the PC Campus Bookstore (The Bookaneer) online. Book rental options are also available. Fee waivers and bus passes are available for students who qualify for the free or reduced lunch program through their school district. In addition, limited book assistance is available for students who qualify for the free lunch program.
